TE PŪTAKE | PURPOSE

This report asks the Waikanae Community Board to approve the renaming of Frater Lane, Waikanae.

HE WHAKARĀPOPOTO | EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

TE TUKU HAEPAPA | DELEGATION

The Waikanae Community Board has the delegated authority to consider this matter under 'Part D Community Boards' of the Governance Structure

Accepting or rejecting. Officer recommendations in respect of names for local roads (excluding the former State Highway and reserves, structures, and commemorative places, in accordance with existing council policy.

TAUNAKITANGA | RECOMMENDATIONS

A. That the Waikanae Community Board approves the renaming of Frater Lane, Waikanae, to Te Ara Tangata.

TŪĀPAPA | BACKGROUND

- 4 Under the Kāpiti Coast District Council's policy, if a member of the community wishes to change a name of a road
 - The proposed name must be validated by Council staff for uniqueness and appropriateness, including consultation with appropriate iwi if required.
 - Affected residents must be consulted by the person or group proposing the change, and a minimum 75% of responses must be in favour of that change.
 - The Community Board shall accept or reject a recommendation,
- ⁵ 'Frater Lane' naming would have occurred under the Horowhenua County Council era in approximately 1970. Extensive investigation into any Council or administrative body around that time for minutes or motions have been explored but have not resulted in any definitive result confirming the Lanes naming.
- The Waikanae Community Board may accept the proposed name within the report or reject the suggested name and request the staff to provide alternative names in a subsequent report.

HE KÖRERORERO | DISCUSSION

- Te Ātiawa Town Centres Working Group (TCWG) have been working alongside council staff since 2014 with the upgrade of the Waikanae Town Centre.
- Members of the TCWG have and continue to actively engage with council over the years, through providing input into embedding the components acknowledging the history of Te Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai Marae located within the Waikanae Town Centre, via the Cultural Thread Project as well as other engagements, advice, and input.

- Part of the Town Centre's development was to focus on integrating Waikanae Marae with the town centre and embed the cultural identity, history, and heritage of Te Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai within the Waikanae area.
- 10 Whakarongotai marae holds a special significance for Āti Awa within the Kāpiti District. It is their only remaining marae at Waikanae, and has been the focal point for iwi activities since the late 1800's. It is believed the original meeting house was moved to its current site by bullock from Tuku Rakau native village which was located within the Greenaway Road, Puriri Road and Waikanae Awa (river) area.
- In 1952, seven prominent iwi women living in Waikanae were appointed as founding Marae Trustees. They were known as Paioke Eruini, Wikitoria Jenkins Ropata, Haua Matenga Baker, Sylvia Rangiauahi Tamati (nee Mitchell), Teiaroa (Ada) Ropata, Pahemata Pirihana Erihana and Tere Rauara Parata.
- 12 From the late 1960's, the Horowhenua County Council began acquiring Māori owned land under the Public Works and Town and Planning Acts to develop the Waikanae shopping town centre. The Māori owners objected to the taking of this land. In 1970 the original right-of-way from the marae to State Highway 1 was changed from vehicle to pedestrian-only access by Horowhenua County Council.
- In 2014 Te Ātiawa Town Centres Working Group (TCWG) was established and are mandated by the Te Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai Charitable Trust to work alongside Kāpiti Coast District Council regarding improvements to the Waikanae town centre, and other town centres within the Kapiti region.
- 14 April 2018 saw work begin on the construction of a paved 'cultural thread' from the Marae and along the ancestral route (via Frater Lane) to the Urupa. These works focused on better integrating the town centre with Whakarongotai Marae, and to help embed the cultural identity, history, and heritage of Te Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai in the Waikanae area.
- The opening of the cultural thread was celebrated on the 1st of August 2018 with a blessing of the new paving design outside the gates of Whakarongotai Marae.
- Te Ātiawa Town Centres Working Group (TCWG) has provided letters of support along with their application to rename Frater Lane, from Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai Charitable Trust Board, Waikanae Marae Reservation Trustees, and the Takamore Urupā, Ruakohatu Urup Charitable Trust.
- 17 The TCWG engaged with the only landowner on the lane and have their support for the change of name.
- Council Officers have researched the origins of the naming of Frater Lane and are unable to find any historical documents on this. They believe they were destroyed in a fire at Horowhenua County Council records building in the 1970's. It is likely the Lane was named after Dr Alec Frater, MBE, who served as Waikanae's only doctor between 1964 and 1971, operating from a surgery based on what is now called Frater Lane.
- The TCWG support the recognition of Dr Fraters contribution to Waikanae through transferring the name to an appropriate memorial.

He take | Issues

- The pathway 'TE ARA TANGATA' is very significant to iwi and hapū because it is the route from Whakarongotai marae to Ruakōhatu whanau Urupā (cemetery), which is located next to St Luke's Church on Pehi Kupa Street. It was also the original entry and exit laneway to the marae.
- The paving design of the pathway acknowledges the history of Whakarongotai marae and the many people of their iwi, hapū and hapori (tribe, sub-tribe and community). It reflects the original pātikitiki wallpaper designs and stained-glass windows within the meeting house, and visually connects Whakarongotai marae to Ruakōhatu urupā. and connects the marae to the Waikanae Township

TCWG are seeking Waikanae Community Board's support to change the name of Frater Lane to Te Ara Tangata as this reflects their history and the existing connection of Whakarongotai marae to Ruakōhatu urupā being the resting place of nationally recognised identities.

Thank you for your time to read our submission request to change the laneway known as Fraters Lane to Te Ara Tangata.

The Iwi Town Centre Working Group ((hereby referred to as the TCWG) have been working along side council staff since 2014 with the upgrade of the Waikanae Town Centre. Part of this development was to focus on embedding Whakarongotai Marae within the town centre, through celebrating its history and heritage, cultural practices and unique identity.

Below is our story, history now, outlining the reason for our submission.

WHAKARONGOTAI MARAE

Whakarongotai marae holds a special significance for Āti Awa within the Kāpiti District. It is our remaining marae and has been the focal point for iwi activities since the late 1800's. It is beleived the original meeting house was moved to its current site by bullock from Tuku Rakau native village which was located within the Greenaway Road, Puriri Road and Waikanae Awa (river) area.

In 1952, seven prominent iwi women living in Waikanae were appointed as founding Marae Trustees. They were known as Paioke Eruini, Wikitoria Jenkins Ropata, Haua Matenga Baker, Sylvia Rangiauahi Tamati (nee Mitchell) Teiaroa (Ada) Ropata, Pahemata Pirihana Erihana (Aunty Polly) and Tere Rauara Parata.

From the late 1960's, the Horowhenua County Council began aquiring Māori owned land under the Public Works and Town and Planning Acts to develop the Waikanae shopping town centre. The Māori owners objected to the taking of this land. In 1970 the original right-of-way from the State Highway 1 to the marae was changed from vehicle to pedestrain-only access by Horowhenua County Council.

In 2014 the Town Centre Woking Group (TCWG) was established to work alongside Kāpiti Coast District Council as part of the Kāpiti Coast District Council's work to make improvements to the Waikanae town centre.

TOWN CENTRE WORKING GROUP

In 2014 the Town Centre Woking Group (TCWG) was established to work along side Kāpiti Coast District Council as part of the Kāpiti Coast District Council's work to make improvements to the Waikanae town centre.

There were four iwi members mandated to represent Āti Awa, Tracey Morgan, Rawhiti Higgott, Simone Smith and Ann-Maree Ellison.

April 2018 saw work begin on the construction of a cultural thread. These works focused on better intergrating the town centre with Whakarongotai Marae, and embed the cultural identity, history and heritage of Te Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai in the Waikane area.

The opening of the cultural thread was celebrated on the 1st August 2018 with a blessing of the new paving design outside the gates of Whakarongotai Marae.

Iwi and council have worked together on the cultural thread project, one of the many stages of planned improvements for Waikanae town centre.

The cultural thread aims to recognise the history of our people and to better integrate the Waikanae town centre with Whakarongotai Marae. A significant aspect of the cultural thread is the paving design – Te Ara Tāngata.

This cultural thread has many embedded components acknowledging the history of our marae.

TE ARA TANGATA

Cultural thread paving design

The pathway 'TE ARA TANGATA' is very significant to iwi and hapū because it is the route from the marae to Ruakōhatu whanau Urupā (cemetery), which is located next to St Luke's Church on Pehi Kupa Street.

Te Ara Tangata reflects our history and connects our marae to the Waikanae Township.

The paving design acknowledges the history of the marae and the many people of our iwi, hapū and hapori (tribe, sub-tribe and community). It reflects the original pātikitiki wallpaper designs and stained-glass windows within the meeting house, and visually connects the marae to the urupā.

Within te ao Māori (the traditional Māori world view) the design also represents purapura whetū (myriad of the stars). "Those that have turned into stars, glimmering in the night sky and watching over us."

Purapura-whetū is encased within pātikitiki (the flounder), which symbolises favourable conditions, and harvests, good fortune and abundance. It is said that when the stars in the sky are in a formation, it is the right time to go and catch flounder. Mā muri ka tika a mua, mā mua ka tika a muri.

The triangular chevrons can be interpreted as not only a waka (spirit medium of an atua), but also the tip of the hoe (used to row or paddle waka) on the voyage. The paving also includes the lashings and whakairo (carved ornamentation) found on the side of waka.

The waka can be interpreted as either facing the marae or journeying away from the marae to Ruakōhatu urupā (cemetery).

Designed and named by Tracey Morgan, in collaboration with the Iwi Town Centres Working Group we acknowledge the Kāpiti Coast District Council for helping bring 'TE ARA TANGATA' to life.

SUBMISSION

We have asked to present to your meeting a request to change the name of Frater Lane to Te Ara Tangata as this reflects our history and connects our marae to Ruakōhatu urupā.

As mentioned earlier the pathway 'TE ARA TANGATA' is very significant to iwi and hapū because it is the route from the marae to Ruakōhatu whanau Urupā (cemetery), which is located next to St Luke's Church on Pehi Kupa Street.

To this day we still carry our tūpāpaku(deceased) from marae down this laneway, across what was State Highway 1 to Ruakohatu Urupa. It is the last journey of our departed.

Attached to this submission are letters of support from Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai Charitable Trust Board, Waikanae Marae Reservation Trustees, Takamore Urupā, and Ruakohatu Charitable Trust (urupā)

We have also engaged with the building owner and have his support too.

We hope that this submission has provided the context and history of our request and that it will be carefully considered. We would be very happy to answer any questions prior to the WCB meeting to make better use of your time and will also make ourselves available for any questions at the meeting.

On behalf of Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai Charitable Trust Board, the Mandated lwi Organisation, we extend our formal support to Te Ātiawa Town Centres Working Groups (TCWG) application to change the named pedestrian laneway from 'Fraters Lane' to 'Te Ara Tāngata'.

From the late 1960s, Horowhenua County Council began acquiring Māori owned land under the Public Works and Town and Planning Acts to develop the Waikanae town centre. The Māori owners objected to the taking of this land. In 1970, the original right-of-way from Whakarongotai marae to State Highway 1 was changed from a vehicle to a pedestrian-only access by Horowhenua County Council. Thereafter, Council named the accessway Fraters Lane after a Doctor in Waikanae. The name 'Frater Lane' has never held any cultural significance to Whakarongotai marae and mana whenua.

The paving design that now sits on this pedestrian lane was recently named 'TE ARA TĀNGATA'.



This cultural thread pathway reflects our history and connects our marae to the Waikanae Township. The paving design also acknowledges the many people of our iwi, and the community, and holds cultural significance for hapū and iwi as the Pathway from the marae to our sacred Ruakōhatu whānau urupā (cemetery), located next to the historic St Luke's Church on Peehi Kupa Street, Waikanae.

Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai Trust Board endorses the renaming of this historic pedestrian accessway to 'Te Ara Tāngata'



The Pathway gives the whanau a passageway to the urupa next to Saint Lukes Church and is tapu on such occasions





TŪĀPAPA | BACKGROUND

- 4 This is the second Waikanae Community Board meeting of the 2023/2024 financial year.
- Grants are allocated in accordance with specific evaluation criteria (at Attachment 1). Criteria include that accountability reports on grants allocated are required to be submitted six months after the event or activity for which the grant was awarded takes place.
- 6 All applicants have been advised by email of the meeting date and time.

HE KŌRERORERO | DISCUSSION

7 Three applications for funding have been received and are attached to this report (under separate cover) as Attachments 2-4. The applications are summarised below.

Promotion Fund

- There is currently \$32,477.00 available for distribution from the Promotion Fund in the 2023/2024 financial year. This amount does not roll over into the next financial year.
- 9 Two new grant applications to the amount of \$2,914.14 is presented for the Board's consideration:

Waikanae Music Society

- Three years of funding of \$2,300 for 2023, \$2,400 for 2024 and \$2,500 for 2025 (\$7,200 total over the three years) is sought to assist with the cost of printing, distributing and advertising promotional material for the Society's annual concert seasons.
- This application could be considered under all four of the criteria: Contributing to making Waikanae a Good Place to live; Contributing to making Waikanae an Active Community; Attracting visitors to the area; Promoting Waikanae as a visitor destination.

Waikanae Bowling Club

- Funding of \$614.14 is sought to assist with the cost of customs charges when importing the smaller bowls for "Kids in Bowls" events and tournaments for primary school aged children.
- This application could be considered under two of the criteria: Contributing to making Waikanae a Good Place to live and Contributing to making Waikanae an Active Community.

Discretionary Fund

- There is currently \$3,871.00 available for distribution from the Discretionary Fund in the 2023/2024 financial year.
- One grant application in the amount of \$500.00 is presented for the board's consideration, of which can be considered under Eligible Purpose 1: *Community, cultural or sports purposes, including travel both within New Zealand and overseas*:

- Applications will be considered for exceptional circumstances.

- 2. Contributing to making Waikanae an Active Community; or
- 3. Attracting visitors to the area; or
- 4. Promoting Waikanae as a visitor destination.

To allow the Community Board to forward plan they encourage organisations to provide an annual calendar of events and activities, and to note the activities which they may need funding for.

Applicants must provide at least 3 quotes for any items to be purchased with the grant money.

Applicants are to give full details of the reason for application, and amount requested, and to note any other applications for funding currently sought from other bodies.

Where an application for funding for a particular purpose might be received from individual members of an organisation and from the organisation as a whole, preference will be given to ONLY funding the organisation as a whole.

Where an organisation anticipates that it will require ongoing annual funding, to be used for the same purpose each year, it may apply for three consecutive years of annual funding within a single application. If such an application is approved, the funding will be released in annual instalments. The second and third instalments will only be released once the Community Board has received a satisfactory accountability report in relation to the previous year's funding. First-time applicants to the Promotion Fund will not be eligible for three years of annual funding.

In a given financial year, the Council may not allocate sufficient funding to the Community Board to enable it to pay all grants arising from three year funding arrangements approved in a previous year. In such situations the available funding will be distributed on a pro-rata basis to those organisations to which funding has already been approved.

Ineligible Purposes

Activities for which funding has already been received from either the Grants Allocation Committee or one of the other community boards in the district will not be eligible for funding from the Waikanae Community Board for the same activities.

Applications will not be considered retrospectively.

Notwithstanding all of the above, the Waikanae Community Board has the right if justification can be proven, to make a grant outside the criteria.

- 2. Groups must be non-profit making.
- 3. Applications may only be made once in a 12-month period, calculated from the date funding was last received, except in exceptional circumstances and at the Board's discretion.

Applications will be considered for:

- Community, cultural or sports purposes, including travel both within New Zealand and overseas.
- 2. Groups or individuals who are unable to receive sufficient grants from other sources because of the time frame or because they are otherwise ineligible.
- 3. Grants to partially or fully offset the cost of any Council permit, licence or resource consent fees on the basis that the proposed activity falls into a "worthy cause" category.
- 4. The remission of hall rental for "worthy causes" in line with Council policy that all remissions of hall rentals are accounted for by being funded from approved grants budgets.
- 5. Where an application for funding for a particular purpose might be received from individual members of an organisation and from the organisation as a whole, preference will be given to ONLY funding the organisation as a whole.
- 6. Where an organisation anticipates that it will require ongoing annual funding, to be used for the same purpose each year, it may apply for three consecutive years of annual funding within a single application. If such an application is approved, the funding will be released in annual instalments. The second and third instalments will only be released once the Community Board has received a satisfactory accountability report in relation to the previous year's funding. First-time applicants to the Discretionary Grants Fund will not be eligible for three years of annual funding.

Ineligible Purposes:

- 1. Capital expenditure.
- 2. Expenses incurred for school curriculum activities.
- Grants will not be considered retrospectively and must be received by the Kāpiti Coast District Council prior to the event taking place and at least eight working days before the Community Board meeting date.
- 4. Activities for which funding has already been received from either the Grants Allocation Committee or one of the other community boards in the district will not be eligible for further funding from the Waikanae Community Board for the same activities.

Notwithstanding all of the above, the Waikanae Community Board has the right if justification can be proven, to make a grant outside the criteria.
